

# 2010 NATIONAL LAND TRUST CENSUS REPORT



## CALIFORNIA

### New Report Shows Strong Growth in Land Conservation


A new report by the Land Trust Alliance shows that land conservation by nonprofit land trusts across the United States is thriving, with more than 10 million acres conserved from 2005 to 2010. Land trusts in California contributed to this success, reporting an increase of 34% in acres conserved over this period.

The Land Trust Alliance has reported on the status and successes of land trusts since its founding in 1982. The National Land Trust Census measures the pace and quality of the important conservation work of local, state and national land trusts in the United States.

#### California's Trends in Conservation: 2005–2010

- Land trusts in California have protected 2,303,442 acres—this represents a 34% increase in acres conserved since 2005. California ranks first in the nation in acres conserved, and first in the Pacific (CA, HI, NV).
- There are now 197 land trusts operating in California, including 103 staffed groups and 44 all-volunteer groups.
- California increased their full- and part-time staff and contractors 89% in five years, for a total of 986 paid positions in 2010.
- Land trusts in California drew upon the work of 13,734 active volunteers (an increase of 94% since 2005) and the contributions of 178,512 members and financial supporters.
- As a signal of the land trust community's commitment to excellence, there are now 16 accredited land trusts in California. Together, these 16 groups have protected 602,428 acres as of 2010.


#### Total Acres Conserved by States in the Pacific



## National Trends in Conservation

- Total acres conserved by state, local and national land trusts grew to 47 million as of year-end 2010—an area over twice the size of all the national parks in the contiguous United States. This represents an increase of about 10 million acres since 2005 and 23 million acres since 2000.
- The number of active land trust volunteers increased by 70% since 2005.
- State and local land trusts' budgets doubled and the number of paid staff and contractors increased by 19%.
- From 2005 to 2010, state and local land trusts almost tripled the amount of funding they have dedicated to monitoring, stewardship and legal defense. They also almost tripled their operating endowments.
