Dear Representative:

Voluntary conservation easements are important tools for keeping land in agriculture and protecting our valuable natural resources for future generations. In 2006, Congress enhanced the tax deduction for donations of conservation easements, but this important conservation tool is set to expire at the end of 2011. We urge you to cosponsor Representatives Gerlach and Thompson's bill (HR 1964) to make this critical tool permanent.

Many of the nation's most ecologically diverse and agriculturally productive lands are owned by working farm and ranch families. Making this enhanced income tax deduction for conservation easements permanent encourages voluntary donations of future development rights to ensure such lands remain in production.

For the farmer or rancher, this decision involves their land, which is typically their largest asset. The previous law, however, prevented landowners from deducting more than a small portion of their generous gift. The enhanced incentive allows agricultural landowners to deduct more of the value of their donation, and increases the number of years deductions can be taken from 6 to 16.

Donating conservation easements requires significant planning on the part of the farmer and rancher, and many will not donate just to meet the artificial deadline that exists now. Therefore, we urge you to join Representatives Jim Gerlach and Mike Thompson as a cosponsor of HR 1964. Please contact Lori Prater in Rep.
